




Importance

- Sex is a combination of chromosomes, genes, sex organs, hormones, and secondary sex characteristics
 - These do not always align with stereotypical binary development of "male" or "female"
- Sex is a spectrum of diverse variations in sex development (VSD) and intersexuality
- Gender and sex can be interconnected but are not dependent on each other

Importance

Importance

- Erasure of VSD and intersex identities in science education reinforces sex binary stereotypes
- Discrimination prevents people of VSD and intersex identities from engaging in research and academia
- Barriers to sex-inclusive resources further inhibit professional development and sense of belonging

- Do not assume bodily traits and experiences based on sex or gender
- Respect work-life boundaries and desire for privacy
 - Refrain from asking intrusive questions
 - Do not give unsolicited advice
 - Provide windows of opportunity for people to define themselves and discuss their experiences on their own terms

- Explicitly include VSD and intersex allyship in professional codes of conduct
 - Define considerate dialogue and expectations of privacy in workplace culture
- Prioritize learning LGBTQIA+ vocabulary that is current and comprehensive
- Ensure survey/form questions on sex and gender are inclusive and optional (anonymous if possible)

- Support the implementation of ungendered, private restrooms and universal resources such as:
 - Menstrual products
 - Contraceptives
 - Breastfeeding spaces
 - Changing stations
 - Needle and hazardous waste disposal
